## Letter from the Board President

Thank YOU, friends, supporters and colleagues! Without you, we could not do any of what we do. At the Regional Transportation Authority, Carolyn continues to advocate for greater investment in multi-modal transportation and providing for wildlife connectivity. The Coalition was proud to facilitate a breakout session and field trip focusing on local connectivity efforts at the May conference on Corridors, Crossing Structures and Connectivity sponsored by the PEW Charitable Trust, Department of Interior, and various Tribal Fish and Wildlife organizations. Jessica continues to work with our wonderful volunteers, monitoring our wildlife cameras and planning for more. We've continued our ongoing work fielding requests from developers for input on their plans. This largely involves encouraging them to better configure their plans to set aside functional natural open space for wildlife and stressing the importance of sustainable and resilient landscapes and building practices, including water harvesting and green infrastructure. We are especially delighted to be working with multiple agencies, including the Tohono O'odham Nation, local government departments, and our non-profit colleagues, to remove obsolete barbed wire fencing and provide better connectivity across Avra Valley and the increasingly isolated Tucson Mountains. And while we will miss Whelan, Kathleen continues to polish all our efforts, running the machinery of our organization with grace and making it look easy! Thank you all for making it possible!


## Our first Desert Wildlife Intern: Josh Skattum

In August 2022, we welcomed our first Desert Wildlife Intern, Josh Skattum. Josh was a long-time volunteer for the Coalition, monitoring wildlife cameras in almost all of our project areas, including backcountry sites in the I-10 East wildlife linkage. **His cameras seemed to have extra special good luck, capturing both our first badger photos and our first photos of a kit fox.** He also enthusiastically participated in our Critter Cam for Kids Field Day events and established important community

connections with the Pima County Master Naturalists, Reid Park Zoo, and the Feminist Birding Club. We were heartbroken when Josh tragically passed away after being involved in a serious car accident in October 2022. **His legacy remains strong within the Coalition. Amazingly, after placing a wildlife camera in his honor in the Tortolita Preserve (the SKATTUM camera), this camera caught our second set of photos of a kit fox this past winter!**

## Celebrating 10 years of Community Science!

**In April 2022, our community science-driven Wildlife Camera Program celebrated years of collecting data and making a difference for Sonoran Desert wildlife and open spaces!**

The data from this program has been used to:

- + Advocate for the hugely successful Oracle Road wildlife bridge and underpass;
- + Demonstrate wildlife diversity and presence in the proposed West Option route for I-11 in Avra Valley;

- + Underpin our proposal for improved wildlife fencing and enhanced wildlife culverts along I-10 East in the Cienega Creek area; and
- + Advocate for a new wildlife bridge over Interstate 10 between the Tortolita and Tucson Mountains (in progress!).

## Fighting I-11: A marathon, not a sprint

In 2022, with your support our ongoing fight against the West Option for the proposed Interstate 11 through Avra Valley continued. In collaboration with three of our member groups - Center for Biological Diversity, Tucson Audubon Society, and Friends of Ironwood Forest — **we filed a lawsuit in the U.S. District Court of Tucson challenging the Federal**


**Highway Administration’s approval of Interstate 11 last year.** The agency approved the highway in November 2021 despite postponing an environmental review or deciding between two route options in Pima County, both of which would harm wildlife, public lands, and air quality and exacerbate the climate emergency. **The lawsuit says this “approve now, study later” approach violated federal law.**

So far, the lawsuit continues to make its way through the courts, including surviving a legal challenge to part of our lawsuit this past January.

## The first Tortolita BioBlitz documents species presence and diversity in the Tortolita Preserve

In November 2022, the first Tortolita BioBlitz was a huge success. **46 participants made 700 observations of over 135 wildlife and plant species in the Tortolita Preserve in just a few hours!** Along with individuals enjoying and documenting species on their own, seven small group outings focused on different type of species and ways to collect data. One of the guided walks headed by CSDP's Jessica Moreno focused on identifying animals by scat and tracks. **Species identified included Grey Fox, Mule Deer, Bobcat, Coyote, and even the tiny and industrious Kangaroo Rat!** Another walk conducted by Jennie McFarland from Tucson Audubon Society and Steven Prager from Audubon Southwest yielded a list of fifteen species including a **Ruby-crowned Kinglet, the first time this species has been documented at the preserve on E-Bird.** Another highlight was the identification of Gregg's Nightblooming Cereus happily existing in the understory of a Palo Verde. We hope this will be the first of many BioBlitzes in this lush piece of desert.




